PAST SIMPLE

Regular verbs + -ed looked (look) Irregular verbs 2º form eat – ate - eaten

- Things finished in the past: He made a cake last night.
- 2) To say one thing happened after another: He got out of the bath and answered the phone.
- 3) For historical events: Shakespeare wrote Hamlet.

PAST CONTINUOUS

Subject + Verb to be in the past + gerund

I / He / She / It was

We / You / They were looking

- 1) To say someone was doing something at a certain time: *This time last year I was living in Brazil.*
- 2) To say something happened in the middle of something else: *It was raining when I got up.*

PAST PERFECT

Subjuect + Had + Past participle

1) To say that something had already happened before something which happened in the past: When I arrived at the party, Tom had already gone home.

PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS

Subject + Had been + gerund (-ing)

I had been looking

1) To say how long something had been happening before something else happened: Ken had been smoking for 30 years when he finally gave it up.

PRESENT SIMPLE

I / We / You / They look

He / She / It looks

- 1) To talk about thinks in general: The earth goes round the sun
- 2) To say how often we do things: He usually plays tennis twice a week.
- 3) To make a suggestion: Why don't you go to bed early?
- Timetables: The film starts at half past nine.

PRESENT COTINUOUS

Subject + verb to be + gerund (-ing)

am looking He / She / It is looking We / You / They are looking

- To talk about things happening about the time of speaking: She is having a bath now.
- To talk about a period around the present: You are working hard today.
- 3) For personal arrangements and appointments: I am seeing the doctor tomorrow morning.

PRESENT PERFECT

Subject + Have / Has + Past participle

I / We / You / They have looked

He / She / It has looked

- 1) To say that you have / haven't done something during a period of time which continues up to the present:

 She hasn't written to me for a month.
- 2) After a superlative: This is the most boring film I have ever seen.

PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS

Subject + Have / Has been + gerund (-ing)

I/We/You/They have been looking He/She/It has been looking

- To talk about an action which began in the past and has recently stopped or just stopped: You are out of breath, have you been running?
- 2) To say how long something has been happening: *Jim has been playing tennis since two o'clock.*

FUTURE SIMPLE

Subject + Will + infinitive

I will look

- To decide to do something at the time of speaking: -A: I can't understand it. -B: I will explain it to you.
- 2) For predictions: Do you think Tom will get the job?
- 3) To promise to do something: I will pay you back
- 4) To ask someone to do something: Will you shut the door, please?

FUTURE CONTINUOUS

Subject + Will be + gerund (-ing)

will be looking

- To say that we will be in the middle of doing something at a certain time in the future: From six to seven I will be watching the match.
- 2) To talk about things that are already planned or decided: *I will be going to the city centre later*.

FUTURE PERFECT

Subject + Will have + past participle

Will have looked

1) To say that something will already have happened before a certain time in the future: By the end of the month they will have been married for 25 years.

GOING TO

Subject + Be going to + infinitive

I am going to look

He/She/It is going to look We/You/They are going to look

- When we have already decided to do something: I'm going to repair my bike tomorrow. (intention)
- 2) For plans: She is going to go shopping on Saturday.
- 3) Evidence that something is going to happen: Look at all those black clouds! It is going to rain.
